

# A journey into judging!

It is often stated that the education we receive through being a Sweet Adeline is fantastic, whether it's through coaching, educational workshops, our own rehearsals during the week or contests.

Another great way to learn, while having the best seat in the house, is judging!

After eight years as a YWIH judge in various regional and national contests, and for my two years as a Certified Australasian Guild of Barbershop Singing Judge (allowing me to judge the Australian and NZ men's' contests), I decided to investigate the SAI programme.

I had heard over the years that the organisation was looking for more Judges, younger Judges.

People had said that it was hard to get into though, and that the costs involved are massive (all costs have to be covered yourself until you reach the fully Certified status).

I sat the required tests (thanks Leigh Whitelaw for supervising), got some

good references and thankfully received an acceptance letter as an Approved Applicant Judge in the Sound category. This is the first step of several until you become a Certified Judge.

Thanks to the assistance of my chorus, I was able to attend my first two contests as a trial scorer this year, also helped by the fact that I would already be in England on our honeymoon at the time of the Region 31 Contest (luckily I have a super patient and supportive husband - long may that last!)

In Region 31 the panel consisted of Renée Porzel, Mary Ashford, Betty Clipman and Janie Macchiarolli! No pressure or anything! They were lovely and made me feel at home, giving me helpful hints, what to do, what not to do, and made it all very comfortable.

As a trial scorer you are expected to take part in everything that the panel does so I was required to take part and contribute in the leveling discussions (sure, no sweat...) however I had my

own room at the breaks as I'm not able to be privy to any information that may adjust my thinking.

It turned out that my chorus scores were much closer than the quartets however this is usual I was told. I am looking forward to improving my scoring at Region 34 next weekend and trying to get even closer to the Sound Judge.

I will get comments back after the Judge Specialist Meeting in July and am looking forward to the feedback.

One is expected to trial score for several years and I am excited about hearing many different regions and bringing back as much of the education that I can to share with my chorus and the region.

If you are interested in judging, go for it! Feel free to ask any questions, I am happy to help.

MOLTO! Quartet is very proud and grateful to be the 2016 Region 35 champion quartet. A huge thanks to all who have supported us in our journey so far. We thought we would share some insights into our journey since last regionals.

Although we achieved the goals we had set ourselves for Vegas, we were hungry for another attempt at international and knew we had plenty more work to do if we were to retain our title at the regional event. We were very grateful for the constructive feedback we received from the international judges; in particular, one of them gave us a rather large hint regarding a specific phrase in our ballad where we shone in our sound. So we took these comments on board and came up with a plan for improving our regional scores.

We thought to ourselves "why not find a local voice coach?" After some searching, we booked ourselves in for a trial session with a qualified voice coach who had experience in musical theatre, opera, jazz, but wait for it.... no history of barbershop. However, it didn't take long for Sally to grasp the concept and what we wanted to achieve. In fact, everything she was teaching us was very well aligned with barbershop-specific teachings: posture, breathing, resonance, lifted faces. Sally addressed all 4 categories of barbershop,

but we particularly developed our showmanship skills. One specific aspect we worked on was the emotional plan for our ballad. When we first found our ballad ('If You Love Me, Really Love Me'), we discovered the story behind the song so we could connect with the lyrics. Edith Piaf wrote it in 1949, to the love of her life. We were using this background to convey the emotion of the song, but our coach could see that we each were telling different versions of the same story. We needed unity throughout to achieve that ever-elusive goal of consistency.

Enter Lynne Smith... Just 2 weeks out from contest, we had the "Lynne treatment" with Greater Auckland Chorus where the group agreed on a phrase-by-phrase emotional plan. Having seen how quickly this unified the chorus, later that day the quartet quickly began brainstorming the emotions for each phrase of our ballad.

We would like to say a big thank you to our vocal coach, Sally Mabelle, and to Lynne Smith, for helping us to get those crucial points needed to get to first place.

Next we are starting our plans for international. On the to-do list: more coaching (local and international), a solid rehearsal schedule, a mammoth

fundraising effort and of course goal setting for what we want to achieve at international this year.

Philippa Rogers (bass) – What an amazing and overwhelming experience to represent New Zealand on the international stage. The more we improve, the more we find we still have to learn and master. It's a constant journey of improvement and that's what's so great about this craft!

Suzanne Berresford (baritone) – I really enjoy having such a unified emotional plan to strengthen our emotional connection to the song. It also helped me realise how I should react when another part is posting and I am not singing.

Jocosa Bruce (lead) – Being a Champion Quartet in Region 35 is never a given. There is so much talent in New Zealand and you have to stay on your game and move forward in order to keep up! A very strong Region, that's for sure, so a huge honour to be a Champion.

Kristina Roper (tenor) - I feel so grateful to have been given another opportunity to represent NZ on the international stage again, particularly given the strength of the competition this year. Looking forward to some hard work and lots of laughs in the lead up to Vegas #2. Bring it on!



How did we develop? Creating more space, always choosing level three singing, never singing beyond pretty and so much more. I think

# Finding my voice again!

July last year, mum persuaded me to go along to Waikato Rivertones Chorus for a six week "Find Your Voice" free singing lessons offer. Singing was something I had always wanted to do but never had the opportunity. Inside there was this beautiful voice singing in my head, coming out was something quite different. If I was trained could someone make my voice sound better?

To stand on the risers with the chorus we had to be voiced placed, to determine our range, the quality of our voices and which part we would best fit. I was not even sure I would get through this first hurdle, but I did and joined the lead section. For the uninitiated in barbershop singing this is the part that carries the melody. The easy part. Or so I thought.

After the six weeks, to join the chorus we had to audition and sing (as one part of a quartet) the song 'Harmonise the World.' Could I possibly pass this I wonder? I must have sung and listened to that part hundreds and hundreds of times. Over and over trying to match the voice on the recording. Figuring that this little one-page song actually did have a few challenges to overcome to sing it well.

The audition I think was the most nerve-racking thing I have done to date. I was literally shaking and this was only a practice to see if I was on the right track with learning the song. But I was tricked! "You've passed" came the cry!

Now the journey to competition! Two songs to learn, choreography, the costume, the face expressions, the make up, the journey had begun.

The last nine months have been one of stretch and more stretch.

To have personal voice instructions with the directors to actually sing alone in front of someone then try and do all the things they say. The breathing, bubbling, posture, open up

the resonating spaces, vowel shapes, tongue positions, breathing exercises, singlish to learn. Learning how to walk on and off the risers and present the entertainment to the audience.

All for six wonderful minutes of fame! We are Rivertones and we are Sweet Adelines.

The chorus know that no one contest is alike and knew it had the product that could garner the desired results; it was just a matter of putting it on stage at the right time with the right audience that panel of four.

The score sheets were a joy to review, there are always those handy hints on what to do next, but these were sheets we thoroughly enjoyed reading. Carolyn was on cloud nine and her new title of Master Director is one the chorus is very proud of. It's been a journey of learning and growing for Carolyn as much as for the chorus and now is her moment to accept the applause – but I have a feeling that there will not be any lapse in the drive forward, she'll be planning the next steps, to keep us on this wonderful road to be the best we can be!

# Master Director Jocosa!

My mother found Sweet Adelines after touring America for a year crossing over 1989/1990. We'd never heard of Sweet Adelines in the 12 month road trip around America.

It took a tiny article in the local Auckland rag advertising a space for low voiced women...and she was definitely that! I went along the next week as they needed help with the high voiced part called Tenor. Here I am, 26 years later with a blue badge saying 'Master Director'. How could this be? These blue badged people were the ones I looked up to; was too shy to talk to. Women and men of great skill and knowledge that had the answers to every question about the how and why of barbershop.

They spoke, you listened. My journey as a Director started when I had the honour of directing SouthCity Harmony, getting us through a successful merger and coming out the other side with a wonderful new name taking both groups in to consideration - SouthCity Soundz.

In my first year directing them we improved by 116! On our journey I was pushed in to the DCP quickly as was told there were moments of awesomeness with this fabulous group...which there were! I ripped the DCP like a Band-Aid and got my first badge - RED. Proudly sporting that badge at the next event and even more proud when our chorus

improved to 554! The rush of being on stage as a Director is amazing. The slight quiver in your hand that you hope the chorus doesn't interpret as a new vibrato passage. First time moments in this wonderful organisation are a constant. 1st time in a chorus/1st time in a quartet/1st time as a Director/1st time on the International Stage in a chorus/1st time on the International Stage in a quartet. These are the memories this organisation is made of. The rush of adrenaline when your name is announced (or not as per Las Vegas 1 - lucky I warned the chorus that could happen!)...the lights smack you in the face and you use them to empower yourself and shine back to the crowd.

From my debut in 2004 till now, every directing experience has been different. Every chorus week has been different. The education and support I have received from the masters themselves has been heart warming. I would not be where I am today without the support from Ann Gooch, Virginia Humphrey-Taylor, Carole Persinger, Kim Vaughn, Zoe Thompson (a fabulous education class at International), Sandy Marron, Judy Poszgay, Vickie Maybury... actually, the list is long and I will forget someone. There is the one person that gave me the initial push to do this, my mother, Melody Lowe. She has so much faith in me. Inspires me to be myself. The confidence she



instills in me is what has made me as cheeky as I am today. I have learnt that a mother's love for her daughter is a bond that no one can break. Without her support, I absolutely would not be here today sporting this blue badge. And for that, I thank her.

Finishing off, it was an added bonus to share this achievement with the fabulous Carolyn Currington. I have been watching her over the years and in the last 2 seen her grow even more. Having Master 700 director Jim Arns say "Watch Carolyn, she is doing it right!" and watching her lift into the strong, capable woman that I knew she was, makes me proud to know her. She is a believer in herself and this is what makes a true Master D! Love sharing this with you, Carolyn. Here's to our future!

#### YOUNG WOMEN IN HARMONY



In 2015, there were over 1000 young women from all over New Zealand who competed in the New Zealand school barbershop contests. A big thank you to the small group of you who volunteer your time and energy at those contests, both on the day, and throughout the year as you coach them and teach them the craft of barbershop.

It is no secret that the membership of Sweet Adelines is at a plateau and that this is a prime focus for our region. Let's take a moment to consider something.

Imagine if all of the young women who are singing barbershop in

schools at the moment (there are over 1000 of them) all joined our choruses straight after they left school?

Imagine how much energy, freshness, vitality and life they would bring to your rehearsals!

Imagine how much fun those young women would have, enjoying this craft, 'making it their own'.

Imagining these things brings such excitement, thinking about the possibilities – but the time is now for us to take our imaginations and make this a reality.

Take a look at ZEAL quartet from Auckland. All were YWIH members at school and joined a chorus not long after they left school and in their first Sweet Adeline's contest, won the Novice Cup AND gained a bronze medal! Wow!

We want to grow, but where can we get new members from? What can we do to help?

We need to be out there attracting those girls who leave school, those in university, those young workers who can really bring a multitude of skills, talents and freshness to our organisation.

I'd like to encourage each chorus to consider what they can do in their local communities to try and open up their chorus to young women.

Look at your repertoire, what are you singing? Is your repertoire one which you feel young women would enjoy?

Are you involved in the Young Singers in Harmony contests? Get involved, be seen around the place, get to know the local school heads of music. Invite school groups to sing in your shows. Participate in community events where you know there will be groups of young people.

Financially, it can be unaffordable for many of these young girls as they enter university or in their first paid job.

Consider a mentoring programme or a 'love fund' to offer assistance.



Some young women need a bit of space while studying or starting out in new jobs – be understanding that they may not be able to attend all rehearsals. Be flexible, be patient, be kind. These girls learn fast! Some may feel threatened by this – others are in awe! Go with it, we can learn from each other, give them the experience and they will give you the energy.

Of course – these things need careful consideration and discussing amongst the chorus – but I encourage you to take up the challenge – it is so worth it.

In 2013 I wrote to Sweet Adelines International and asked them to consider bringing the Rising Star to NZ, to showcase the number of young people we have singing barbershop in this country, and I am SO glad that they will be here this year as part of the Pan Pacific Youth Harmony Festival in Auckland. Get behind your local schools and see who you can get there — it is going to be an awesome event.

Another exciting event that has arisen is the 2018 Barbershop Harmony Society Midwinter Convention. This is the International Mens' barbershop organisation convention held in January each year.

This event has now opened up to the youth, and they are welcoming young men AND women to participate.

So - we have been in touch with the organisers and will be looking to send expressions of interest to young girls who want to sing, and any Sweet Adeline who is interested in assisting through fundraising, sponsorship, workshops etc.

I would again like to thank the small but dedicated group of wonderful

ladies who have volunteered their time and efforts in helping these young women. Those of you in schools, those who are coaching, those who have volunteered their skills and time as young women in harmony judges – thank you! There were a group of 13 ladies who came to Wellington to learn more and up-skill in judging and will be given the opportunity to shadow judge at the Rising Star contest in Auckland this year. These ladies need our support as they put themselves out there. We will be looking to make training more frequent and are considering more ways in which this can happen, but a huge congratulations to them and to the other ladies around the country who put their hands up to perform this huge duty on contest day. A special thanks to David Brooks, Claire Takacs and Matthew Gifford who taught over the two days.

I'd like to thank the Prue Blythe Memorial Trust for their support and assistance with the YWIH programme. I'd like to thank Kate Veeder for her constant support of the YWIH programme and thank the region for their generous donations at contest as well as the raffle where over \$3,000 was raised. That is awesome! These funds go towards these young women, the running of youth workshops, regional and national young singers competitions.

There is no doubt that New Zealand Youth Harmony is healthy, alive, and others around the world look to us. Let's all get behind it, and really, truly, keep the whole world singing.




