The Perils and Benefits of Quartetting 35

What is it about forming a quartet that's engenders such secrecy? Is it the fear of auditioning for a part and being afraid of rejection? Do you feel you've stuck your head above the parapet and become vulnerable? Do you imagine yourself dissolving in a mess of nerves when facing an audience? Might you forget or stumble over your words?

All those feelings are a normal part of auditioning and performing. Getting four voices that blend well together can be quite a mission – even if they are voices that are individually great. Sometimes voices just lock into one another like magic, other times it can be hard work. We shouldn't be put off by a quartet audition which doesn't work out.

Recently, a couple of "old hands" at Wellington City Chorus hosted an afternoon for "quartet wannabees". Participants were asked to learn a song for the event, and we had a great response, with one foursome already rehearsing together. Everybody had a go at singing their part with different voices. There is interest in having more mixing/matching sessions and we'll continue in the New Year.

It was an enlightening experience
– we all learned a lot – for instance
about how different voices can change
the overall sound of a quartet, how
one person's voice can enhance the
sound of another voice, and what fun
it is to actually have a go! It was also
interesting to experience the reality

of everyone's role within the quartet, such as how you might have to take breaths differently from how you would on the risers.

We touched only lightly on some of those things and plan to have further sessions. Our aim is to encourage anybody who would like to have a go at quartetting, whether your desire is to enter national contests and aim for the stars or form a local quartet that likes to sing and practice together. Whatever the outcome, your chorus will benefit from it because the learning that takes place in a quartet can only benefit the larger group.

Some choruses are really good at encouraging, forming and maintaining quartets, and this is often reflected in those choruses' performances. If you don't already provide a pathway for your members to join a quartet, please consider doing so – your whole chorus would grow from the experience.

Region 35 Arranging Workshops 35

Rowena Harper and Carole Prietto teamed up to offer a series of arranging workshops over Zoom, hosted by Region 35 and attended by arrangers from New Zealand, Australia, Canada, the US, and the United Kingdom. The first class, on June 9, covered formatting the manuscript. A clear, readable manuscript is important because it communicates the arranger's ideas to singers, directors, and coaches. Carole took a poorly formatted manuscript, gave tips on how to improve it, and shared a "cheat sheet" which summarized the basics of doing a proper manuscript.

The next class, on August 18, was The Arranging Process. Using the traditional song 'Our Homeland Aotearoa' Carole outlined a process for what to do when you find a song you wish to arrange, beginning with picking a song, then finding sheet music, how to select the right key, beginning to arrange. She also discussed basic harmonization of the 11 chords as well as chord substitution – what to do when a melody note falls outside of the basic harmony in a given passage. The class also talked about voicing and voice leading. Voicing refers to how chords stack up vertically to get the strongest sound. Voice leading refers to the movement of each part line. The harmony parts should have lines that move in logical ways so that they are as singable as possible.

In late August, arrangers who use Finale received a sudden announcement that Finale was no longer being developed. Carole taught a class for arrangers needing to transition from Finale to another program. She demonstrated how to convert Finale files to MusicXML, a file format that lets notation programs share information with each other.

Carole and Rowena demonstrated the notation program Dorico and answered questions about it.

On September 18 Rowena taught the final class, Making Better Choices. The class addressed how to make chord choices that were both strong barbershop and fit the song's original harmonies. The class also addressed creative choices - when and how to apply embellishments such as echoes, swipes, and key changes, to make a more interesting and exciting arrangement. This class had arrangers at a variety of levels, from beginners to ACP scholarship recipients, and there was much good discussion about both the arranging process and the creativity of bringing an arrangement to life.

In Loving Memory of Dale Syverson

Master Director Dale Syverson was the musical director of the fantastic Rich-Tone Chorus, renowned for their beautiful singing and spectacular dancing prowess. She was a judge in two categories, Expression and Sound. A fabulous coach, a baritone extraordinaire, Queen of Harmony, in The Tiffanys and Rumors quartet (who were brought to NZ to teach by Christchurch City chorus in the year 2000) and she was always laughing and teaching at the highest level. She was humble and enjoyed cheese and biscuits as an appetiser or after chorus rehearsals.

As the daughter of a barbershopper, Dale was part of the Sweet Adelines organization since she was a child and is a five time international gold medal winning chorus director and two time international gold medal winning quartet singer.

"dale was the ultimate barbershop teacher."

She studied and researched her passions 'the singer's voice' and 'ensemble excellence' continuously. Dale was revered amongst barbershop circles.

She wrote many excellent papers about how to achieve the ultimate beautiful sound and how to deliver each vocal detail with excellence. She learnt about singing techniques used throughout the ages, and then taught everyone she encountered what she had learnt, so that they too could improve and have a deep

understanding of everything to do with their vocal production.

Dale, Darlene Rogers and Peggy Gram formed the superb team that produced the Sing Baby Sing series as well as a website of information to improve everything to do with singing. The barbershop ensemble techniques that Dale and her team put together are second to none and are mostly available on the Sweet Adelines International website. From Spike to Velvet, Trap Shooting, Accessorizing Your De Lorean - embellishment use and enhancement, vocal production etc - everything you need to sing at A level is covered. They wrote it down and then taught it.

At education symposiums anywhere in the world, Dale captivated her audience with her knowledge of barbershop techniques and her teaching ability. She was funny, focused, and always had something of high quality to teach - we all wanted to be pupils in her classroom.

Her famous 'How to direct a Ballad,' when she used the ballad, 'A Nightingale sang in Berkley Square,' made us all cry; the beauty in her choreographed conducting was mesmerising.

Here are some of her gems from all over the world. You will find many other wonderful titbits of information to inspire you with your learning on her memorial site that the Rich-Tone Chorus are building:

- Breathe and sing above the hands.
- To add ping to our sound we need to add more three dimensional space rather than more back space.
- Sing into the space of your neighbours.
- Singing is all about making choices.
- Sing vowel to vowel called Tunnel of Vowel.
- Pitch is not sound it's just pitch!
- Ringing sound = unbounded freedom, with use of fully activated imagination. It's visceral, glows and sparkles.
- Sound either rings or it sucks swamp water!
- Every sound you make, pitch you sing, deserves its own space.
- Breathe into your space before you sing, no over singing. Ever. Causes blend to go away.
- Aim for horizontal energy rather than vertical energy - i.e. smooth travelling vocal line.
- Top load your air don't frontload.
- The stationary parts, AREN'T.

- Parts must be singing in motion.
- You're at the most powerful, every time you take a breath.
- GOAL: Fluid delivery of artistic sound.
- One size does NOT fit all.
- Excellence = a whole bunch of 'moments in time'.
- Every breath should refresh the overtone stack.
- A skilled musician brings everything she IS to everything she DOES. She doesn't wait to be told...
- Gravity always has a 'grab' on it.
- We 'spit' on notes that should be too high for our part!
- Pitches go DOWN. Sound ONLY goes UP.
- Sing with CERTAINTY. BLOSSOM the sound. Sound is constantly in motion.
- Artistic awareness = consonants are as important to the sound as resonance. (Example: mother saying a child's name - we all knew when we were in trouble.)
- Breaths are punctuations in the story line, not a place to serve singer's needs.
- The listeners feel when they hear SOUND, not chords.
- All embellishments should have all four parts engaged.
- What causes 'sausages'?...



Weakness in sound, release of energy, breathing in the wrong place.

- Intentional imbalance....use it, show it off.
- Add height in the sound before you add volume.
- Alive delivery of song brings an elevated degree of musicality.
- Tenors, slide directly up to that note. This isn't the time to be Moses wandering in the desert...
- Breathe to create art, not because vou need it.
- The goal is to sing so we can draw pictures in Dale's imagination!

Dale you were loved by all, and your legacy will live on forever.

FLEUR DE FARIAS SOUTHCITY SOUNDZ CHORUS




Christchurch City were so proud to represent New Zealand at Sweet Adelines International in Kansas City this year.

Christchurch City Chorus recently celebrated a 5th place finish at the Sweet Adelines International Competition in Kansas City. Among their talented members are two women whose journeys to the international stage were both unique and complementary. Heather, a mother of two young children, and Mel, whose children have grown and left home are both new members of the chorus, the front row, and the international competition scene. Despite their different life stages, they each found a powerful sense of community, joy, and fulfilment in singing with this remarkable group of women.

HEATHER'S STORY: BALANCING FAMILY AND PASSION

For Heather, a mother of two young children, preparing for an international competition wasn't just about rehearsals and learning songs - it was a family affair. Her children and husband were a constant part of the

journey, waving goodbye from the window when she left for practice, singing along to learning tracks in the car, and even creating their own 'sheet music' at home.

'Leaving my kids for 12 days wasn't easy, but it wasn't just those days -it was the whole lead-up to the trip,' Heather says. 'My husband was incredible, and nana moved in to help while I was away, but my family had been supporting me for months - particularly in attending the monthly full weekend rehearsals.


Heather admits there were moments of guilt, but the experience of being overseas without the daily demands of motherhood felt like a refreshing break.

'Being responsible for only myself, singing all day, dining out with friends, meeting new people - it was a dream. Even the long flights felt luxurious. Any mum will understand how rare and precious those moments of solitude can be!'

The highlight for Heather wasn't just making it to the finals; it was coming home, scooping her kids into her arms, placing the medal around her daughter's neck, and seeing the joy on her children's faces.

'Earning 5th place was amazing, but nothing topped that reunion. By sharing their mum with the chorus, my kids earned that medal as much as I did.'







MEL'S STORY: EMBRACING A NEW CHAPTER

Mel found herself at a different stage of life. With her children grown and an empty nest at home, she was ready to embrace new opportunities and discover new passions. Feeling a shift in her parenting responsibilities Mel realised it was time to focus on her own interests and adventures.

'There can be a sense of emptiness when your kids leave home,' Mel shares. 'It's a big adjustment, but it also opens up a world of new possibilities. Joining Christchurch City Chorus has been one of the most enriching decisions I've made.'

'Joining the chorus was a happy accident,' Mel explains. 'I had planned to take a photography night class, but when it was rescheduled, I started searching online for things to do in Christchurch on a Wednesday night. From the very first rehearsal, I knew I had found something special. The energy, passion, and dedication of the group were incredible. Watching them perform their upbeat song 'Happy' was all it took - I was hooked!

Mel's journey to the international stage was filled with emotion. After the nerves and adrenaline rush of the semifinal performance, she felt both eagerness to get back on stage and the exhaustion of long days and disrupted sleep. But the excitement of making the top 10 took hold – 'We did! I want to do that again!'

'The emotions came in waves - excitement, exhaustion, and pride. I wasn't the only one with a few tears; many of us felt the same. It's a testament to how much we put into this.'

For Mel, the magic of singing with the chorus lies in the connection and shared energy.

'There was a moment during a rehearsal in Kansas City when I completely lost myself in the music,' Mel says. 'Standing in the front row, I was so immersed in the beautiful sound coming from the risers that I forgot the choreography. The sound, the energy, the beauty literally stopped me in my tracks. Our director paused the rehearsal - not to give feedback, but to say how beautiful it was and that we'd given her goosebumps. It's moments like those that remind me why I do this.'

As new members and first-timers to the international stage, both Heather and Mel didn't know what to expect, but they leave with a renewed commitment to continue singing, dancing, and growing with the chorus.

'Performing our finals package was a highlight," they both agree, "but the real reward has been the journey-learning, connecting, and being part of something bigger than ourselves. This experience has been life-changing, and we're already looking forward to what's next.'

In February this year the seed of an idea was planted by Emma Worthington, a chorus member, who had recently been to a successful fundraising event hosted by a pair of dynamic, comedic women. And what can we say about Ethel & Bethel themselves? What absolute winners! From the pre-event organising with Emma, to when they first arrived on the big night, pulling up to the venue in their car with a honk

The Greater Auckland Chorus Tourney to Kansas City: A Harmonious Rollercoaster

The Greater Auckland Chorus Journey to Kansas City: A **Harmonious Rollercoaster** Ah, what a year it's been! From Auckland to Kansas City, the **Greater Auckland Chorus has been** on a whirlwind journey that began back in May 2023. That's when we clinched the top spot in the small chorus division at the regional competition. With our soaring

score qualifying us first among the top five globally, the invitation to the prestigious Harmony Classic Division A was in hand. Cue the excitement - and the planning!

And plan we did. To conquer the international stage, we plotted a roadmap covering the timeframe for outlining the theme, member qualification dates on songs,

mandatory rehearsal dates, and everything else needed to get buyin from all our talented singers. And with that, we were revving the chorus engine. Next, we had to settle on the specifics of our concept and song lineup. But this wasn't just a 'pick your favorite tunes' situation: we wanted a theme that would wow audiences. and to use the approach of selecting songs to fit the story, rather than build the story around the songs. With that in mind, Jocosa Bruce, Kristina Roper and Anna Graham gathered for some serious brainstorming. Out of this think tank emerged a cohesive, theatrical 15-minute 'Haunted House' entertainment package - something bold, fun, and uniquely us. With two songs specially arranged by our inhouse musical wizard, Kristina Roper, we were well on our way.

After months of hard work and effort from our incredible director, Jocosa Bruce, as well as from every single member in multiple aspects of preparation and planning,

May 2024 found us taking our concept for a test drive on stage at the regional competition in Dunedin, where we showcased a shortened version of our package. It was an invaluable experience, complete with audience appreciation and judges' feedback to fuel our Kansas City dreams.

Then, we stepped things up with coaching sessions from two phenomenal external coaches. They worked with us on theatrics, staging, and storytelling, transforming us from harmonious singers into full-on entertainers. And let's just say, 'selling it' on stage quickly became our new forte. In July of this year, I had the privilege of travelling to the USA to attend two incredible events: the Directors and Visual Leaders Seminar in Tulsa and the **Barbershop Harmony Society's Harmony University in Denver.** Both experiences were gamechangers for my musical journey, offering inspiration, new techniques, and a deeper understanding of barbershop and singing, not to mention directing!

After a few travel hiccups following the global IT crash, I made it to Tulsa and met up with the rest of the SANZ contingent for the DVLS. Surrounded by passionate directors and visual leaders from all reaches of the organisation, I learnt about methods to enhance our chorus's stage presence and storytelling through song, tuning vs. intonation, and tips for creating choreo plans while keeping the voice in mind. We explored techniques to elevate performance energy, helping our singers connect with the music in a more authentic way. And we had some fun with Ben Bram (co-creator of Pentatonix) adding some pop embellishments to the weekend's song. Imagine the horror of the lead section when they were told they didn't have to hold the note all the way to the end of the phrase!!





Next it was on to Denver for Harmony University - an immersive week filled with classes, coaching, and networking. It was truly a barbershop lover's dream! From vocal pedagogy to arranging and directing, the learning opportunities were endless. The expert faculty were incredibly approachable, sharing invaluable insights and knowledge. Some highlights were learning about vocal science and what's physically happening in the voice, and having some personalised coaching and development on my directing skills. I'm told a handshake from the mighty Dr. Don Campbell is hard to come by! Actually, now that I reflect on it, the entire trip was a highlight!

I came home with fresh ideas, a renewed sense of purpose and selfbelief, and countless resources to share with my chorus and the region.

My thanks to the region for selecting me as the 2023 Education Scholarship recipient, and I especially thank my wonderful chorus, Nelson Bays Harmony, without whose daily support and encouragement this trip would not have been possible! I encourage anyone who has the chance to attend either of these events - it will be transformative not only for you as an individual but for your entire chorus community!

It wasn't our original intention to have custom songs in our Haunted **House themed Harmony Classic** package, but a change of plans resulted in a very cool connection between the Greater Auckland Chorus and US artist Brenna.

Initially, we planned to use existing arrangements, but it turned out the 'scene setting' song we considered was only available in a medley which didn't fit our narrative. Using some reverse engineering, I searched the ArrangeMe database for 'haunted house' and eventually discovered 'This House is Haunted' by Brenna. Its spooky jazzy vibe was perfect, so I had a go arranging it in barbershop-flavoured a cappella. The arrangement worked, the scene was set and we successfully performed it as part of our abridged package at regional contest.

While scrolling Facebook postcontest, I saw a post where Brenna expressed her surprise and gratitude at being a top 10 artist on Spotify for a few fans. I commented, saying that I was one of those - her song was my #3 song after listening to it a LOT while arranging by ear explaining the full back story and that we would be performing it in KC later in the year.

About six weeks later, Brenna replied: OH MY GOSH WHAT HOW DID I MISS THIS COMMENT!!!!!!!! Do you have any recordings of this?!?! I NEED AN UPDATE!!!' We connected via messenger, and I sent her some clips and swore her to secrecy until after our international performance. The chorus was thrilled to hear that the original artist knew of and was excited about our endeavours.

As we were getting ready to depart NZ for Kansas City, I received another message from Brenna: 'Hi Kristina! I hope preparation for Kansas City is going well! Question... is the event open to the public?? If I could swing it, it would be so cool to come see you perform my song.... If I can though don't tell the chorus!'

Given she lived between Texas and NYC, I wasn't hopeful, but fortuitously she had been nominated for a Josie award in Nashville and was prepared to go on a side quest to meet us.

The morning of the visit, I sent the chorus the video of her original song to maximise the chances of them recognising her. Everything went to plan, and when Brenna arrived, the chorus was ecstatic! She spent the rest of the rehearsal with us, saving the experience was extra special as she used to sing in her collegiate a cappella choir. She then joined some of us for lunch. It turned out her song was only on ArrangeMe due to a collaborator, and the first she knew of it was when I contacted her! It was truly meant to be.
