Worldwide Committee and Song Assessment of Organisational Materials Task Force

I'VE HAD A FEW PEOPLE ASK ME WHAT IS REQUIRED OF BEING ON THE WORLDWIDE COMMITTEE AND MY SONG ASSESSMENT WORK, SO I THOUGHT THIS AN APPROPRIATE PLACE TO SHARE.

The Worldwide Committee is a small committee of three Sweet Adelines: Debra Griffiths from Region 34, Australia, leads the team and Annika Dellas from Region 32, Nordic Lights, and myself make up the Committee. We get together over Zoom every two or three months and discuss the updates from our areas of interest. For me that is the Pacific and Asia. especially Japan, and for Annika it is areas in Europe, particularly Germany. These are emerging areas where an interest in Sweet Adelines has been established and we are nurturing them as some groups begin their journey into becoming chartered choruses and others take their very first steps into singing together in harmony. We are also responsible for representing the other regions outside of the mainland of the United States of America and we recently put forward to the International Board some requests/ ideas which affect our own regions, for their consideration.

Annika and Debra are both very accomplished Sweet Adelines and come with impressive backgrounds in organisational skills, so it is a pleasure to serve with them as we help others enjoy the world of singing a cappella music and ensure that regions beyond the USA have a voice at the International Board table.

My work on the Song Assessment Task Force has involved many, many hours of watching YouTube clips of Sweet Adelines performances and detailing their content. Our task is to identify any songs or material which the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Committee has deemed inappropriate as a result of their review of music and have listed those songs as 'not to be sung or sung with lyric change', etc., on the Song Database.

Our Task Force of approximately six members meets every two or three months by Zoom to review our work and to plan the next stage of clips for review. Our results are presented to the Sweet Adelines International Board regularly and the board will work with our results to determine next steps.

As a result of my viewing of material which covers very many years, I have seen before my eyes the growth in our organisation from costume, emcee work to amazing performance upskilling and so much more. It's been a wonderful opportunity to observe and hear some truly dazzling singers and I'm happy to say it's not a hard task at all!



An added bonus was being able to have a live question and answer session with a talented and knowledgeable Certified Judge and Queen of Harmony.

The recent BHNZ competition titled 'Everyone in Harmony' was the first of its kind to open its doors to all genders and was a wonderful weekend of collaboration and camaraderie.

This year I was the lucky recipient of Region 35's Education Scholarship award, which I used to support my attendance at SAI's International Education Symposium in San Antonio, Texas in July 2022. With a hiatus of educational events in recent years, this was a great opportunity to get back into the swing of learning, growing, and networking with the international barbershop community. The event is formatted into streams according to areas of focus, such as directors, coaches, arrangers, guartets, and visual leaders, so it really caters to anyone and everyone. For me, with my different hats of musical leader, guarteter, associate director and faculty member, there were classes to suit all my needs, although it was a little hard to pick one class over another!

One highlight for me was the Music in the Morning sessions to start the day off, featuring Kim Vaughn and Vickie Maybury, as I learnt many new vocal exercises to add to my toolbox. Another highlight was signing up for the symposium chorus, directed by Lori Lyford and Dale Syverson. It's not every day you get to sing in a chorus with directors of international champion choruses, so I savoured every moment of that experience and thoroughly enjoyed our final performance. I even had a few emcee lines which was something completely new for me – always good to push yourself outside your comfort zone!

As for some of the specifics of the classes, I attended a couple of sessions about getting to the next level, which is something that many of us strive for. These sessions took some of the mystery out of this and I am planning to convey my learnings in this regard at the upcoming regional workshops. Judy Pozsgay presented a session on authentic visual expression, which was timely given the recent changes to the Visual Communication category. This was nicely complemented by a session from Vickie Maybury on singing from the heart, as both focused on really feeling the message of the lyrics - this is an area of growth for me personally so I was glad to learn some new ways to work on this.

The event offered several opportunities for connecting,

socialising, and singing, and I came away having caught up with old friends and acquired firm new friends. I also got to watch the inaugural Diamond Division Contest as well as the Rising Star Contest, and it was so great to see barbershoppers young and old with a common passion for singing in harmony.

"41 singers gathered together for He Tangata's first venture onto the competition stage which proved to be more than we could have hoped for. Receiving a fabulous score of 72 points and gaining 7th place, just 3 points behind the City of Sails men's gold medal chorus. One judge commented he could not believe we only met 4 times a year and created such an awesome sound. We loved it! Well done BHNZ! Well done us!"

"Seeing the overall winners Pacific Connection Chorus under the direction of the amazing Henrietta Hunkin-Tagaloa was definitely a highlight and a moment we will all remember for their incredibly authentic and stunning musical performance. The calibre of quartets and the amount of younger members climbing the ranks was also something that gave everyone a united sense of excitement".
