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Christchurch City Chorus – 5th placed international chorus

At the 2016 Sweet Adelines International Competition held in October the Christchurch City Chorus attained three outstanding achievements:

- 5th place Chorus
- Most Entertaining Chorus
- Master Director 700
 Virginia Humphrey-Taylor

This is the 8th time the Chorus has competed on the international stage. They last performed internationally in 2013 in Honolulu placing 6th.

The journey to compete in Las Vegas #2 began when Christchurch City Chorus became the Region 35 champion chorus in 2015. The Chorus then committed to its goal of eclipsing its previous performances and results. This also meant committing to the many hours of rehearsal and personal practice that this would require. This included at least one weekend per month of additional coaching from wonderful international coaches including:

- Choreographers extraordinaire

- International Champion Chorus Directors; Britt-Heléne Bonnedahl, Lori Lyford, Jana Gutenson, Jim Arns

- Pitch Perfect Musical Director Deke Sharon
- International Expression Judge Lea Beverley

In Las Vegas, the Chorus undertook over 40 hours of rehearsal, many kilometres of walking (it's a long walk to anything at the MGM Hotel) and a show with Rönninge Show Chorus (2017 International Champion Chorus). Throughout their stay in Las Vegas, the Chorus received encouragement and finetuning from their ever-supportive coaches as well as rehearsal visits from Queens of Harmony.

The Chorus took to the international stage with 133 members whose ages ranged from 21 to 79 years. This included two sets of mother and daughter and seven sets of sisters! It was great to share the experience with many out of town members who represented choruses from three Sweet Adeline Regions – Region 35 New Zealand, Region 34 Southern Cross (Australia) and Region 32 Nordic Light (Denmark, Finland, Norway and Sweden). It was also particularly pleasing to be able to support MOLTO! and Aftershock! in the guartet competition in Las Vegas.

Carole Persinger, International Expression Judge, says of the Chorus' finals package "your strong musicality enabled you to get through this demanding and awesome performance".

The Christchurch City Chorus is now looking forward to its next challenges and developing further as a chorus. They would like to thank all the members of Regions 35, 34 and 32, and their families and friends for their support throughout this journey.

It has been a real journey for Foveaux Harmony Chorus over the last six to seven weeks travelling through a wide variety of singing styles and events.

Our first event was at the Arrowtown Spring Arts Festival and it was a great privilege to be asked to participate in this Festival. They had heard of us through word of mouth and we grabbed the opportunity to raise our profile and share our craft.

As part of Foveaux's contribution to the festival, the chorus held a morning workshop and people registered to attend. The attendees were a talented and enthusiastic bunch and quickly got to grips with the song we were teaching them, moves and all! We also performed in a free concert later that day where they joined us on stage for one of our favourite repertoire songs, the Abba Medley, with lots of support from their family and friends. Although Arrowtown isn't exactly in the catchment area for an Invercargill chorus, we made sure to introduce all the workshop ladies to one of our members who commutes each week from nearby Glenorchy (only 10 | TheAddaline

a three hour drive each way) and discussions are under way to set up a satellite group in the Queenstown area. This was a great chance to show off the Sweet Adelines craft to a wider audience. We all really enjoyed the weekend and received lots of positive feedback.

Awaiting us when we got home was a request from one of our Southern Institute of Technology students, Betsy Knox, to be a back-up group for one of the songs in her final assessment. We had two weeks to put it together and we were definitely up to it. Not something we'd ever done before but we loved the song 'Bathe in the River' and the soloist, Ma Bradshaw from The Vixen oozed soul from every note in her rendition of Hollie Smith's hit.

The performance with a full backing band, sung to a full house went

really well and we revelled in a standing ovation before heading to a local restaurant for dessert and coffee to celebrate. It is especially warming to have students come up to you to say how amazing the song was and how the backing was amazing!!

No time to rest on our laurels. The very next weekend we were singing at Singfest. An event held each year to celebrate choirs in Invercargill and the surrounding area. There was a real mixture of choirs, with two men's groups, mixed choirs and we were the only all women's group. Foveaux Harmony set the standard for the afternoon concert as the first group up, singing three songs from our current repertoire. 'Loch Lomond', arranged by Traci Voss was a favourite. The haunting violin solo by Jo Williamson sets the scene for this song and we are so fortunate to have the beautiful voice of Amy Polaschek, a new member, to sing the solo part in this song. You could have heard a pin drop when we finished, before the applause began.

All the while during these last few weeks we had also been rehearsing continued over page for a major fundraiser to raise money for our local hospice. Our chorus had been invited to sing in the 100+ choir for the "Last Night of the Proms." Sarah Rae, our Director, was the choir director and led the several combined rehearsals we had together before joining with the Ascot Park Brass Band and the Invercargill Symphonia for the final practices and on the night under the direction of Matthew Dick.

This was a glittering occasion at our local Civic Theatre with a royal reception beforehand and then on to the grand event. We wore our elegant black velvet costumes for the first half and sang some wonderful songs including 'Barcelona' and 'O Fortuna: Carmina Burana.' Half time saw us all changing into our own versions of red, white and blue and heading on stage for a fun-filled but exacting second half including the classics traditional for the Last Night of the Proms. The choir did the Can-Can with white gloves under ultra-violet light and this seemed to be an unexpected highlight for many people. An amazing evening enjoyed by both audience and performers, with a huge amount being raised for the hospice.



More – yes there is more. Three days later we were singing at our local Calvary Rest Home for Melbourne Cup Day, with some of our songs becoming a bit of a sing-a-long for the parts they knew.

Overwhelming? Almost! Invigorating and challenging? Definitely. Special is the fact that our six new members have done the journey with us, learnt all the songs and loved every minute of it as much as the rest of us do. Now starts the slippery slide into Christmas with lots of requests for us to sing out, in fact more than double what we usually do. Here's to Christmas and barbershop singing!!

It wasn't always easy, things didn't always go as planned We had our share of ups and downs, and sometimes things were canned Cancelled flights and sickness and, when we were nearly through, Half the Chorus battling the dreaded Vegas flu.

But when we got up on that stage, we glittered and we shone We shared our love of barbershop with those Sweet Adelines We thrilled our friends and family, won the Audience Award And Christchurch City Chorus came home Fifth in all the World!

Greater Auckland Chorus

2016 Production - **"Gotta** Get Out of this Town!"

Producer and chorus member Joanna Lyes promised, "funk, factions, and infighting – all with an a cappella twist" - and she wasn't wrong! This was GAC's third foray into musical theatre, coming hard on the heels of Trick & Treat in 2014, and Vegas Here We Come! in 2015, also created by Joanna. She said, "We were honing the skills we learned from previous shows - this genre proved to be a great learning tool for everyone. The chorus is full of talented women and we were so excited to share this with our audiences."

Inspiration from this year's production came from Footloose, Kenny Loggins' 1984 hit song from the movie of the same name. Chorus director, Melody Lowe, explained further, "We introduced the chorus to Footloose, and immediately everyone loved it. It was a winner from the get go." The chorus members certainly showed their love of the song by delivering a lively and funky version of the hit, showing off their dancing skills to boot!

The story of the show was initially familiar to all our chorus fans. We see GAC on the contest stage, delivering their finely-polished ballad, and then uptune, when disaster strikes! A beloved member, Beryl, falls from the risers taking several members with her. Some days later, as they find out Beryl is in a coma, the chorus is in mourning, and sing a beautiful rendition of Les Misérables' Bring Him Home, sung as Bring Her Home. As the chorus then practice Uptown Funk (with very slick dance moves!), the management team decide that excessive choreography was to blame for Beryl's fall, and things have to change.

The chorus' loyalties are tested, and eventually the members split into four factions. One of the groups believe that singing should be all about the facial expressions until someone sprains an eyebrow, while another faction delivers One Note Samba with uniform precision. California Dreaming is the offering from the faction who just want everyone to please get along... But differences eventually lead to collaboration and acceptance, and as Beryl recovers from her trauma, GAC is once again reunited to perform as a whole chorus. The Footloose finale was everything the show had built up to – glitz, glitter, and glam, with a distinct West Side Story feel and energy.

The audience was also thoroughly entertained by a competition-ready performance from the MOLTO! Quartet, giving us a preview of their 70th Sweet Adelines International package.

Gotta Get Out of this Town! cleverly weaved many other popular tunes into the storyline, including Hooked on a Feeling, Don't Stop Me Now, RESPECT, and Come On Get Happy. GAC transported the audience to a comical and heart-warming behindthe-scenes tale of chorus life – not only the wonderful music, but the bonds of friendship, the laughter, and sometimes tears.

In a poignant note, the programme for the show recorded GAC's dedication of its performance to Janet, doyenne of previous shows and sorely missed chorus member since her passing earlier this year. Joanna's talent and promise delivered once again, with notable support from her daughter Susannah, a top notch backstage crew and a cast of dedicated chorus members. GAC is keen to continue what is fast becoming their most enjoyable brand of live performance.

Britt-Heléne Bonnedah

Two-time Sweet Adeline International Champion Chorus Director

In June 2016, Britt-Heléne Bonnedahl, co-director of Rönninge Show Chorus visited Christchurch for coaching with the Christchurch City Chorus, as part of their build up to the 2016 Sweet Adelines International Competition, For Britt-Heléne and husband Lars, this was their first trip to NZ.

Why did you agree to come to New Zealand? Given that it is on the otherside of the world to Sweden and a 40 hour flight.

First of all, I've never been here before. I've been travelling a lot and seen many Sweet Adeline choruses all over the world. I'm always curious to see new places and honest to God, Virginia [Humphrey-Taylor] has been very persistent with her invitations. My husband was very anxious to come with me and I don't travel that far

without him if I have a choice. I know you [Christchurch City Chorus] are a terrific chorus. I am always aspiring to work with good people.

I've noticed that you've been coaching in England recently. Where else have you been coaching?

I have coached in Germany, Holland, Netherlands, Finland and Japan.

How did that [Japan] go?

They are wonderful. I have three choruses there that I am a mentor for. So it is a lovely relationship - very different and very special. The first time that I was there, I was with my daughter. It was right after she had become a queen again so it was very popular. We had a lot of fun and saw a lot of the country. We stayed one and a half weekends. And then I went back just to work with different choruses.

You've heard us [Christchurch City Chorus] sing for two days now. What do you think is New Zealand's biggest challenge in the world of Sweet Adelines? For example, getting away from our kiwi accent.

I'm probably not the right person to judge in that area. Well I have a pretty heavy accent myself; it's not my field of expertise. What I can tell is your challenge is the same challenge as we [Rönninge Show Chorus] have and everybody has - to use all the tools that we have, the competence we have, strive for excellence and do it all the time. I don't think that you have any different challenges that other choruses don't have. You probably have a lot of advantages that other choruses don't have. I can feel that most of the people in your chorus are very, very enthusiastic who work really, really, really hard and



are striving for excellence. That is a wonderful atmosphere.

What is a little known fact about you that not many people know?

What is probably surprising to a lot of people, you might recall pictures of the chorus when we performed our class in Baltimore. All of the chorus had black tops with RSC on them - I painted all those. I love to paint. Several years ago, I was visiting a chorus where they had hand painted logos on their shirts and I thought it was really cool so I learned how to do that and then just accidently started to do our [RSC] logo a little bit and then we, my husband and I, we worked out we could just take our letters and it was easy to paint. So that is my meditation these days - to paint. Now I paint white and black. We can't have gold this year. Not until [after convention]. That is something nobody really believes when they see the whole chorus - "How do you do it?" "Well Britt-Heléne does it."

What do you see as some of the biggest challenges for the future of Sweet Adelines?

To keep the balance in between good barbershop, the craft and still be a little bit more contemporary. To attract younger people and to find people who can be creative to move us forward while still having our feet in the craft. I don't especially appreciate what some of the male groups are doing when you can hardly hear that it is barbershop any more. I don't think that is the way that would be optimal for us but we can't be so square either. We need to develop.

I think that was a challenge that we [Christchurch City Chorus] found earlier in the year with having Deke Sharon here - he is right there on the edge of contemporary a cappella. That is his field.

Yes, but he was an eye opener in many ways when I heard what he was teaching also. I mean, why do we do some of the things that we do? When something's so plastic that, we do just by habit.

So you have reached great heights with RSC. What are your plans and challenges for the future with RSC?

To get further. Not to just be. Nothing makes me more happy, than when we competed for evaluation and the judges say you have developed further. We have been very pleased with our win [in 2013] and very appreciative that we could do that. But the best thing is that we keep on singing as well, instead of just being satisfied and putting on our shoes, we keep on trying.

So given that, do you think an 800 score is possible? A perfect score?

No, no I don't think so. I have had so many conversations with judges and when the bar is raising and raising and raising and they don't know how they are going to judge it anymore, then they are going to lift the expectations. There will be many more choruses with higher points but I don't think there will be anyone with 800, no. I don't think so. They will always leave a little space.

As they should.

Yes, because no one is perfect.

What are your strongest memories from when you got that first championship medal?

Since we had visualised everything around the [competition] and we knew we were so good, we were prepared for winning and [receiving] high scores. I thought the chorus had done everything we'd asked for and so that went very smoothly. Then we had everything come in after that with all the expectations that are kind of surprising, that they demand from you, that the organisation demands from you. [We were] doing things that could be a little stressful and then we did the swan-set pretty beautifully. We got a lot of praise for that. Then [there was] this marathon week that started with a concert in Carnegie Hall, we had a show the night after, on Tuesday the swan-set and on Saturday a one and a half hour class. We had to be there [for the class] at 7 o'clock in the morning and we were supposed to demonstrate everything. When David [Wright] demonstrated how he has taught us to sing above the pitch, we sang the intro to "Maybe I'm Old Fashioned", which is a very tricky intro, intonation wise, and the chorus were above the pitch. Then I almost died. "Where are you getting your stamina? Where are you getting this?" It was just pretty darn wonderful. So I do admire my chorus enormously. They are fantastic, they are fantastic. Well it would have

so easy to say that it is Saturday morning after a full week, right now we didn't succeed – but we did.

What advice do you have for beginners in Sweet Adelines?

Work hard. Never so hard that you lose the joy in what you are doing. When you lose the joy in singing and produce instead and be good and excellent then so much is gone, so much is gone. It has to be joyful and you have to work with yourself to make it joyful. And it isn't joyful everyday. It is a lot of hard work. But, everything that comes with it! Sometimes I look back on what would I have done if I hadn't been a chorus director and started with barbershop. I would have been a singer that is for sure. I was already a singer. But so many other things in life has been enriched by [it]. I mean, I don't think we would have had the chance to come to NZ for instance if we didn't have a reason or [had] been invited. That is, well, [one of the] many things that comes with it and most of all the joy of singing and the joy of having friends all around the world. That is fantastic.

You've done a lot of things in your time as a Sweet Adeline, in your time alone as a Sweet Adeline. Is there anything else you want to do that you haven't done? Do you want to direct a men's chorus? What do you want to do that hasn't come to you yet?

Unfortunately, it is something that is not going to come either. I would very much have loved to be part of a successful quartet. I have sung in a couple of quartets but never on a level that has been really successful. I have never worked on my own voice so that I could be a really good quartet singer. I have mostly been a director. And why not on the front row! And dance on the front row. I think when I was younger that I had a good enough voice for the front row. I used to tease that is my previous life I would have liked to have been a dancer.

It has is nice to see that it has that current through your life. Through your daughter and your granddaughter now. You just need to live vicariously through them. And I think that we have encouraged them to sing and not specifically barbershop. It just happened to be. It could have been any type of music.

Last question, what is that favourite thing that you like to cook that everybody loves? Do you cook?

Yes, I cook. Well, if you ask my grandchildren it's my meatballs. Swedish meatballs with cream sauce. Oh, it is good. Reindeer stew is also good.

What does reindeer taste like?

It tastes like very thin meat. Reindeer comes in thin slices. [You] fry it together with onions and mushrooms and [have with a] cream sauce. [You] eat it with rice.

Since this interview was conducted, Rönninge Show Chorus has become the 2017 International Champion Chorus in October 2016 with a score of 3,098 out of a possible 3,200.



Heart Beats of Hawkes Bay

Some wore 'hoodies' and 'hip hopped' around the stage, while others jogged, cycled or shot goals. Others traded their wares of ice cream, cold drinks, balloons and flowers. We resolved to sell the 310 seats solely through our chorus members, an achievement we accomplished and are very proud of.

St John was our charity of choice and a percentage of our profits went to this worthy cause. It goes without saying that any surplus funds will go a long way towards getting our gals to Dunedin in 2017.

Several guest artists were invited to participate to complement the planned three acts. Each act highlighted an aspect of the 'Heartbeat' of Hawkes Bay summer and the family, the internationally acclaimed annual Art Deco celebration, and the strength of a cappella, four-part harmony in the bay. Over the months the show team met, pondered, dreamed and kept stretching expectations. Every chorus member stepped up to make it happen and family members were appointed to the many job vacancies!

Husband-man-power took the tasks of taking care of props, acted as stage hands, doormen, security, sound and video. While daughters, granddaughters and loyal friends filled the gaps as ushers, stage crew, dressing assistants and ice cream sellers. In the background, chorus members worked tirelessly each week on the chosen song repertoire for the show, both music and showmanship. Many lost sight of their comfort zone in the process! What we do know is that the positives from this experience will carry forward into the future for our chorus!

Was the Show a success? Judging by the many accolades showered upon us since the big night - the answer is a resounding YES. Will we do it again soon? Ahh - maybe just focus on Dunedin for the time being! But golly gosh - there's no business like show business!

Lacemakers and A Cappella Singers – so alike!

The singers in Lower Hutt's Sweet Adelines barbershop harmony chorus, entered the dining hall at their weekend retreat ready for a wellearned break and some conviviality over lunch. Placards had been placed on the tables and thereby some of the chorus members noted that one of the other groups sharing the retreat facilities, also shared their name "Faultline". Faultline Lacemakers and Faultline Chorus. What a fascinating coincidence. What could be more vastly different than lacemaking and a cappella singing?

THE LACEMAKERS

Taking intricate patterns and the finest of silky threads, a group of dedicated enthusiasts weave these into ethereal gossamer fabrics that are delicate with light and shade. These are pleasing to the eye as they take their shape and forms. Preparation and understanding of the key elements is crucial and only years of experience can produce perfection. Each stitch has its place; one stitch wrongly placed will throw the whole piece out, affecting all those before it and those to follow. The spaces between each carefully placed stitch are as much a part of the fabric as

the thread that surrounds them. With much patience and love for their craft, with dedication and learned techniques, the Faultline Lacemakers weave fabrics of such great beauty that we marvel at the delicate pieces.

THE SINGERS

Taking intricate patterns of sound and their physical instruments, a group of dedicated singing enthusiasts come together to create a musical sound of perfectly pitched notes. As the notes take their shapes and forms, they are pleasing to the ear. First the group works on the instrument that produces their own unique sound their bodies - with an understanding that the correct stance and breathspace aid the perfect placement to produce each note. These sounds can be made to be ethereal and bright, resonant and rich, or dark and velvety as each note is placed next to another and another to create the perfect fabric of light and shade. The breath spaces are as much a part of the sound as the chords that surround them. Blending harmoniously, the notes rise and weave upwards and outwards: the intense softs, the dynamic growth, the ringing chords, and the suspended sighing breaths

that allow light into the spaces between each phrase. With much patience and love for their craft, with dedication and practising of learned techniques, and with some awesome mentoring and coaching, the singers finally hear and feel the chords ringing and resonating in the air around them. They smile and are proud to be a part of such beautifully crafted musicality, and the listeners too smile and marvel at their beautiful singing.

Lunch over with; the dedicated enthusiasts of both groups resumed their endeavours toward perfection in their chosen crafts. For the lacemakers it is mastery of the hand-eye coordinated skill and dexterity of their art. For Faultline Chorus it is mastery of a perfectly sung triplet, a well executed intense soft, a carefully turned diphthong, a resonant dynamic hanger and, ultimately, a chorus which performs in perfect harmony.


